Alexander Jachnow, 36, architect and lecturer at the Habitat Unit, Faculty of Architecture and Urbanism, TU Berlin, since 2001. He teaches "City Profiles" at the International Urban Management Master course. Among others he gathered work experiences at the SEDUVI in Mexico City and with CEARAH Periferia, Brazil in a favela upgrading project in Northeast Brazil. He organized urban design studios and lectures on housing provision in Mexico, India and South

Africa, on urban conservation in Uzbekistan and China. His main research focus are human settlements and stakeholders in urban development of the cities of the South.



Anne Doose, 26, studies architecture at the TU Berlin, specialized on urban planning and social housing in Latin America. In 2004/2005, she studied at the School of Architecture in Porto, Portugal and subsequently worked 5 months on Favela-Upgrading strategies for the municipal government in Fortaleza, Brazil. She visited Mexico City several times, last in 2003, when she was an intern in the program „Mejoramiento de Vivienda“. Her Diploma-thesis is a research on

the possibilities of verticalization of social housing estates in Brazil.



Astrid Ley, 32, architect and lecturer at the Habitat Unit, TU Berlin since 2003. In 2001 she conducted a feasibility study for the 21 household project in Cape Town, South Africa. She worked as project coordinator at Agenda-Transfer with a focus on Local Agenda 21 processes in Germany until 2003. She is a specialist for local governance at the Urban Management Master course and works on participation, public space and urban development in South Africa. Her research focus is on urban governance and cooperation between local government and civil society structures in the field of housing.

Paola Alfaro d'Alencon, 35, architect and lecturer at the Habitat Unit since 2003. Additionally she taught at Cornell University, N.Y., USA and Universidad Catolica de Chile, Santiago. Among others she has work experiences in architectural and urban design praxis in Berlin and New York City. During 2005/2006 she developed further research activities at the Berlage Insitute in Rotterdam for Winy Maas at the Generic City. Her current work focuses on the transport development in dense city areas, particularly the role of the viaduct for the development of the Berlin inner-city train.

Temporarily based in New York, Paris and London, he also travelled Europe and gained insights especially of Italy and France. He executed projects in

housing, office-, and town planning in Germany, France and a town planning competition in the Eastern Chinese Sea, near Shanghai. Recent projects include a Hotel in Berlin and a multipurpose high rise building in Riga, Lettland.
